


Banks are open from 11:00am to 4:00pm on weekdays. Foreign currency and traveler's checks can be exchanged into "Reais" in some specific banks in Brasilia (Banco do Brasil, Banco Central, Banco de Boston and Citibank). It is recommended that exchange be made at the counters or bank agencies of Banco do Brasil located in the international airports of Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo and Brasília.

Credit cards (VISA, MasterCard, American Express and Diners Club) are generally accepted at hotels, department stores and restaurants.

Tipping is a common practice in bars and restaurants. A normal tip is 10% of the price on the bill. Usually the tip is already included in the bill.

Electricity in Brazil is 110/220 Volts. In Brasilia, the standard voltage is 220 Volts. The three-pin plug is adopted as standard, but several formats can still be found. It's recommended to bring a universal adapter.



All the main buildings in Brasilia were designed by the famous Brazilian architect Oscar Niemeyer.

Near the venue of the event, there is the TV Tower, one of the most famous touristic points of the city. It has an illuminated fountain that works almost every day of the week at night. Brasil 21 Complex is also next to City Park, one of the biggest urban parks of the world and the biggest one of the South America.
